RED Express - Methodology



- 1,000 interviews conducted by phone using a random digit dial sample to ensure all households, including ex-directory, are covered.
- Quotas set and final data weighted to ensure that the sample is randomly representative of the total Irish population aged 18+.
- Fieldwork conducted as follows:

22nd-24th June 2009.




The preference witnessed is for the statement that suggests that parents have the right to choose from a variety of publicly funded schools, with over 7 in 10 respondents choosing this statement.
